Edward Via College of Osteopathic Medicine VCOM Mission:

Under Dr. Tooke-Rawlins leadership, VCOM has established 4 campuses collectively, with VCOM becoming one of the largest medical schools in the United States, with a mission and commitment to care for rural and medically underserved populations. The College has graduated over 6000 physicians and has been named in the top 10 colleges for graduates entering primary care (>60% each year). The College boasts a 95% to 99% average first time pass rate for all students on COMLEX Boards, a greater than 99% residency match rate for graduates, and is one of the most affordable private medical

schools in the country coming in at fourth (from lowest) in tuition and fees of all private medical colleges annually.

Dr. Tooke-Rawlins has spent her career focused on medical care for rural and medically underserved populations. VCOM's mission is focused on care for the rural and medically underserved populations in the Appalachian and Delta region. The success of the College's mission under Dr. Tooke-Rawlins leadership and commitment to rural and medically underserved populations, has resulted in VCOM's enrollment of approximately ¼ of their students coming from communities of less than 10,000 and approximately ¼ of the students from communities of less than 30,000. Committed to medically underserved populations, VCOM ranks as one of the leading medical schools in the country for African American and Hispanic students enrolled each year. Success in the mission has been shown with over 60% of VCOM students enter primary careand over 60% of the alumni practice in a rural or medically underserved area.

VCOM Graduates boast high board pass rates and 99 to 100% residency placement annually. In addition to being known for primary care and a commitment to medically underserved populations in Appalachia and the Delta, VCOM is recognized internationally for their global health outreach programs, providing care in VCOM established medical clinics in Central America and the Dominican Republic. VCOM is also known for their top rated Sports Medicine programs.

Dr. Tooke-Rawlins began her early career in Emergency Medicine in Delta Community Hospital in Sikeston, Mo. and in Southeast Hospital in Cape Girardeau, Missouri, practicing for 8 years in the field of Emergency Medicine. While in Cape Girardeau, Dr. Tooke-Rawlins established the Women's Center for St. Francis Hospital which continues today.

In 1988 Dr. Tooke Rawlins began her medical education career serving as a faculty member for KCOM in both the family medicine and emergency medicine. She also served as the Chief of Staff for the Scotland Co. Hospital. In academics, Dr. Tooke-Rawlins practiced FM for KCOM affiliated clinics and served as s Sports Medicine physician for Truman University. When her husband Dr. Frederic Rawlins began his clinical training in Michigan, Dr. Tooke-Rawlins was hired as FM residency faculty and later Residency Program Director in Grand Rapids, Michigan. When Dr. Frederic Rawlins entered his EM residency in St. Lukes Hospital in Bethlehem, Pa; Dr. Tooke-Rawlins was hired as Family Medicine Residency faculty and later promoted to Program Director. Duringthis time Dr. Tooke-Rawlins was a teaching Physician, practicing the full spectra of family medicine including obstetrics, newborn care, adult medicine, and Emergency Medicine.

Dr. Tooke-Rawlins is best known as a champion for rural health and care for medically underserved populations and has focused her career on the interests of Osteopathic Medical Education, Rural Medicine, Health Care Disparities, and Global Health. Early in her career as an Emergency Medicine Physician she volunteered in the free prenatal clinics in Scotland Co. Missouri, and later in the free Prenatal Clinics in Adair County, Mo. While at VCOM she established service-based programs for the students and faculty including rural Free Clinics, medical outreach programs for remote communities, Mini-Med school programs for rural high schools, and summer science camps for gifted students from at risk communities in Appalachia. To advance global healthcare Dr. Tooke-Rawlins has developed VCOM partnerships with International Medical schools in Central America sharing medical education best practices and leading the initiative to establish year-round sustainable clinics that serve the poor in El Salvador, the Dominican Republic, and Honduras. Dr. Rawlins often attends these medical outreach activities with the VCOM students in Appalachia and in the International countries.

Dr. Tooke-Rawlins is a member of an osteopathic family, married to Frederic A. Rawlins D.O., an Emergency Physician also accomplished in academics as a Senior Associate Dean for Simulation and Technology; and two sons Major Frederic Rawlins D.O. of Biloxi Miss., a pulmonologist and critical care physician recently in the air force and now in Critical Care Medicine in Virginia and faculty member for VCOM; and Jonas Rawlins D.O. an internist and also a faculty member for VCOM.
